2009 Rule Changes

1..Preregistration will be required on all Open, FFA & 4-H animals, including rabbits and poultry. Registration must be postmarked not later than July 24, 2009. The forms are available in the premium book or contact the NCW Fair office at 745-8480. Exhibitor tickets must be purchased through the NCW Fair Office by August Exhibitor tickets can be mailed or done in person. Those exhibiting without attending the fair will still need to fill out the registration information at the same deadline. No exception.

2..Carcass class; Pre registration deadline is July 24, 2009. Live judging for beef will be Sunday, August 23, 2009 at 1:00pm w/ fees paid no later than that day. Sheep and swine judging will be Thursday, August 27, 2009 at 8:00am with fees due in or before Wednesday August 26th.

3. Quality Assurance Market Health Records are required before entrance into the Fair for all beef, sheep, goats and swine will be required for the 2009 NCW Fair. Documentation will include place of birth and location where livestock was raised for each animal marketed and third party verification. All documentation is needed at the time of the vet check on August 26. No documents presented at time will forfeit admittance into the livestock sale on

Saturday the 29th. NO EXCEPTIONS. For more information, contact your local 4-H or FFA club.

4..Absolutely **NO dogs** will be permitted on the fairgrounds or RV parks with the exception of service dogs, concessionaire or entertainer pets and 4-H member exhibits. The owner must present the dogs certification papers or the exhibitors card at the office so a permit can be issued. All animals must be on a leash at all times.

6. All animal equipment and exhibits must remain until 6:00 p.m. on Sunday.

7. All lambs must be shorn within 30 days prior to the fair. Blackface breeding sheep must be identified with a flock ID # assigned by the state office before movement of such sheep from the premises of origin for the show, sale, purchase or other movement. Tattoos, electronic implants or tamperproof tags must be from an approved supplier may be used. Blackface sheep are defined as Suffolk or Hampshire breeds or crosses of other breeds with Suffolk or Hampshire breeds. All sheep over 18 months of age (ewes, lambs and wethers);all sexually intact sheep(rams and ewes, including ewe lambs under 18 months of age)going to a show, demonstration or exhibition must have official identification. Official ID for sheep is defined as: 1) USDA issued ear tags with assigned flock ID number and individual animal serial number.2) Legible ear tattoos with USDA assigned flock ID # and individual animal series # (tattoo).3) Ear tags and/or legible ear tattoo resulting from current active registration in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Certification Program. **All sheep other than wethers under 18 months will not be admitted to the fairgrounds without proper official ID.**

8.. Goats – All sexually intact goats (buck and doe) going to a show, demonstration or exhibition must have official ID. Official ID is identified for goats as

- 1) USDA issue ear tags with assigned flock number and individual animal serial number.
- 2) Legible ear, flank or tail fold tattoo with USDA flock ID # and individual animal serial(tattoo)
Legible breed registration tattoos (breed tattoos should be registered with the USDA Veterinary Services) when accompanied by their breed registration certificates or when the registration numbers are listed on a certificate of veterinary inspection.
- 4) Ear tags and/or legible ear tattoos resulting fro current active registration in the USDA Voluntary Flock Certification Program.
- 5.) Electronic implant devices when animal is accompanied by an implant reader, and the implant number is listed on a breed registration certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection. **All goats other than wethers will not be admitted to the fair without official ID.**

This year added to livestock sale is Market Goats. All goats are a maximum of 1 year of age indicated by the milk teeth. Weight is 65 lbs – 140 lbs max

9. Barn Duty hours are from 8:00 am to 8pm,Thursday – Saturday and 8 am to 5pm Sunday
The wash racks, scale area and show ring are considered a part of barn duty.

10..RV Park – All trailers are required to have sewer adapters NO USE OF AIR CONDITIONERS THROUGH OUT THE FAIR. Any conditioners found on will be unplugged.

11. Please keep your exhibitor tickets until after you receive your premium check.

You will need your card to prove your ID number in able to question any check amounts or mislabeled exhibit cards

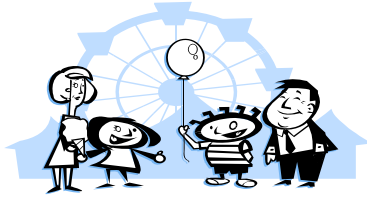

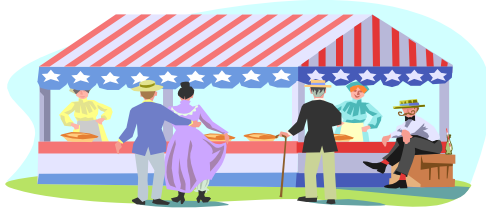

GENERAL RULES & PERSONNEL GENERAL RULES

A. SPECIAL NOTICE TO EXHIBITORS:

WEDNESDAY OF THE NCW DISTRICT FAIR IS "Entry Day". WE ENCOURAGE RESIDENTS OF THE SIX COUNTIES IN NORTH CENTRAL WASHINGTON TO EXHIBIT, BUT PREFERENCE FOR RV SPACE AND LIVESTOCK STALLS GOES TO THOSE LIVING IN DOUGLAS COUNTY FIRST.

DEADLINE FOR ENTRIES IS AS FOLLOWS: (Please check 4-H and FFA Departments for SPECIAL TIMES and entry information).

1. Open Class Exhibits must be in Wednesday 1:00-9:00 p.m. only.
2. Commercial Exhibits, setup 6:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., 8:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m.
3. All livestock exhibits accepted from 3 p.m. until 8 p.m. Wednesday. Our animal health requirements include a visual inspection by the Fair Veterinarians, and they will be available only during those hours. ALL LIVESTOCK ENTRIES MUST COME THROUGH SOUTHEAST GATE ONLY TO BE CHECKED BY VETERINARIAN. LIVESTOCK NOT ALLOWED OUT OF LIVESTOCK AREA. Once animal is vet checked, animal must not leave fairgrounds livestock area before completion of Fair. NOTE: Rodeo arena is not considered part of livestock area.
4. Pre-registration and purchase of exhibitor tickets will be required on all Open, FFA & 4-H animals, including horses, rabbits & poultry. Registration deadline is to be postmarked no later than July 24, 2009. No late entries unless room is available. Forms are located on line at the NCW Fair website or at the NCW Fair Office. Tickets can be purchased via mail, phone or in person at the NCW District Fair Office, 509-745-8480. Monday thru Friday, 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.
5. The dress for all FFA showing contests will be as follows- dark jeans, collared shirt, FFA jacket, appropriate shoes and no hat.
6. No entries can be accepted on Thursday morning unless mailed and received late.
7. NO ENTRIES, TACK BOXES, EQUIPMENT, and POSTERS, INCLUDING COMMERCIAL, MAY BE REMOVED BEFORE 6 P.M. SUNDAY NIGHT OR EXHIBITOR WILL FORFEIT PREMIUM MONEY, REGARDLESS OF WEATHER.
8. Exhibitors and workers will be expected to purchase Exhibitor or Season tickets and present them at the gates when entering. An Exhibitor or Season ticket will admit the bearer to every part of our Fair, including the Race and Rodeo, both Saturday and Sunday, but excluding the Thursday and Friday night concerts and the Friday and Saturday Night Dances. This is not considered an entry fee, but it is very necessary if your Directors are to award the Premium payments that our Exhibitors have received in the past.
9. ALL EXHIBITORS ARE REQUIRED TO REGISTER AND RECEIVE THEIR EXHIBITOR NUMBER BEFORE PRESENTING THEIR EXHIBITS TO THE DEPARTMENT CHAIRMAN.
10. ALL FAIR PARTICIPANTS MUST CONDUCT THEMSELVES AS RESPONSIBLE CITIZENS. Any misconduct or unlawful acts on the part of the Exhibitor, patrons or leader will be grounds for suspension of that person from participating in the NCW District Fair. In the event of misconduct on the part of any citizen involved in the NCW District Fair, the Executive Board of the NCW District Fair Board, along with the Department Superintendent and Director in Charge of department involved, will rule on the suspension. Any person or persons suspended from the Fair will forfeit all ribbons and premium monies and will immediately leave the fairgrounds. If that person is an Exhibitor, arrangements for removal of exhibits must be made at once. The NCW District Fair Board will set the length of time of suspension period during their next failure to exhibit: "An exhibitor who fails or refuses to exhibit an animal or article for any

reason which proves unsatisfactory to the Department Chairman, and General Manager, shall forfeit all fees and rents paid by him, as well as premiums won by earlier exhibits, and does not have the right to put an animal in the livestock sale. The General Manager may order the exhibitor to vacate such stalls, pens, or space and remove such exhibits from the Fairgrounds. Should there be any unnecessary or embarrassing delay in bringing animals into the show ring, the Department Chairman will exclude such animals from the competition in the class called.

11. Every animal or article must be entered for competition in the name of the bonafide owner or maker, whose number must be endorsed on the entry card. Anyone trying to deceive the Department Chairman in regard to ownership, or anyone who shall purchase articles or borrow them for the purpose of exhibiting shall forfeit all claim as exhibitors.
12. All decorative materials to be used in the exhibits must be fireproof according to the Laws of the State of Washington.
13. No animals to be removed without the Superintendent's approval.
14. It is the department Judge's option to award a "Best of Show."

B. DOG RULES - *For the safety and comfort of your animals, we require you leave them at home unless they are to be exhibited at the fair.*

1. Policy regarding dogs on the North Central Washington District Fairgrounds and property located in Waterville, Washington during the annual N.C.W. District Fair and during other Fair sponsored events:

STRICT ENFORCEMENT NO DOGS WILL BE ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS

2. "Fairgrounds" defined as any area requiring paid admission, the RV areas or other posted areas.
3. Exceptions
 - a) Dogs assisting visually or hearing impaired persons.
 - b) Dogs participating in Dog Show and/or Classes.
 - c) Dogs traveling with vendors.
 - d) Entertainers' dogs which are part of a performance contracted by the Fair.
4. All persons with dogs which meet one of the above exceptions must apply for and receive a permit before the dog will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.
5. Restrictions:
 - a. Dogs for visually and hearing impaired must accompany person that the dog is assisting.
 - b. Dogs participating in Dog Show and/or Classes: Dogs to be allowed on Fairgrounds for Dog

Show and/or Classes purposes only. Dog must be returned to benching area immediately after Show or Classes. Dogs will not be allowed in other areas of the Fairgrounds.

- c. Vendors' dogs: Must remain within the rented vendor's area at all times except when being exercised.
 - d. Entertainers' dogs- Dogs must be a part of Fair-contracted entertainment and must remain within Entertainment Area and be removed from Fairgrounds upon completion of contracted entertainment.
6. All dogs must remain on a leash when outside of a cage or a vehicle.
7. Dogs will be exercised in "Dog Area" ONLY. All droppings must be picked up immediately and placed in the proper waste receptacle.
8. Dogs that are disruptive, unmanageable or are deemed unsafe to the public will be asked to be removed from the Fairgrounds immediately and the dog permit will be revoked.
9. All person(s) with dogs must produce permit upon request by any Fair Board member, Fair Manager, or any person acting on behalf of the N.C.W. District Fair.
10. "Puppies" are considered dogs.

11. All stray dogs will be removed from the Fairgrounds and transported to the Douglas County Humane Society Shelter.
12. Permitted dogs in camping areas, parking lots or on other Fair-owned property must be exercised in "Dog Areas" only.
13. Permitted dogs will not be allowed to run loose.
14. Permitted dogs that are disruptive or unmanageable will be asked to be removed from the Fairgrounds RV areas.

C. GENERAL RULES

1. The general supervision of the Grounds and the entire exhibition, the Police regulation, and control of the exit and entrance gates and/or barns and buildings, meaning when they shall be opened and closed and/or locked, is vested in the President and Manager of the N.C.W. Fair Association.
2. Advertising restrictions: "No person, unless contracted by N.C.W. Fair, will be permitted to distribute advertising matter upon the Grounds, except from their place of business or exhibit space. The tacking or posting of any advertisement, bills, etc., other than within the space occupied by exhibits, is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, fliers and heralds will not under any circumstances be permitted. Anyone violating this rule is liable to fine or expulsion from grounds. Begging, soliciting, singing or public speaking are positively prohibited."
3. NO EXHIBIT, TACK BOXES AND EQUIPMENT, INCLUDING COMMERCIAL EXHIBITS OR DISPLAYS, SHALL BE REMOVED, OR DISASSEMBLED BEFORE 6:00 P.M. THE LAST DAY OF THE FAIR, REGARDLESS OF WEATHER CONDITIONS.
4. LIABILITY FOR LOSS OR THEFT: "The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to the fairgrounds, either for exhibit or for other purposes, assumes, as a condition of his admission to the grounds, all risk of and responsibility for its loss, damage or theft. The N.C.W. Fair employs guards, traffic directors and other personnel to protect property on the grounds, and insure the safety of persons. The Fair and its Officers and Employees cannot and will not accept responsibility and liability for any damage or injury resulting from theft, fire, the elements, accidents, or other conditions or causes, whether to exhibits, property of concessionaires, vehicles on the Grounds, and articles therein, or any other property of any nature whatsoever. Exhibitors, concessionaires and others having property on the grounds, should make their own arrangements for guarding and protecting the same."
5. The Management reserves the right to remove from the Grounds any exhibit, animal, concession, show, person, or group of persons, that may be falsely entered, or deemed unsuitable to the nature of the Fair, or objectionable to the general public. Removal will be immediate without return of money paid for space, stalls or admission.
6. ACCESS TO CONCESSION – "Any official representative of the N.C.W. District Fair shall have access to the premises of any exhibitor or concessionaire at any and all times."

D. PREMIUM INFORMATION

1. All premiums will be paid by check as soon as possible after judging has been completed, usually within 60 days from the end of the Fair. Premium checks are mailed to the Exhibitor address given at the time of entry. Checks that cannot be delivered because of insufficient address will be held by the Treasurer of the Fair, after ninety (90) days from the date issued, all checks not cashed will revert back to the General Fair Fund.
2. The value of points for awards will be set by the Directors of the Fair at the first Board meeting that a complete financial report can be submitted after the Fair. If from stormy weather or other causes the receipts will not pay for the premiums awarded, the premiums will be paid by an equal division of the receipts to the

exhibitors who have been awarded premiums, after paying the expenses of the Fair.

3. Judging of exhibits: Judges have been carefully selected by the management and each is recognized for his or her capability of making expert decisions in the respective Division for which chosen. All exhibitors making entry for the Fair accept these judges and agree to abide by their decisions. The decision of the Judges will be final in all cases. If an exhibitor attempts to interfere with the Judge in any manner during the time he is judging, or publicly expresses disapproval of the decisions made by the Judge, he will be excluded from further competition and any premium previously won will be forfeited.
4. Protest: All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$20.00 in the Livestock, Horse Racing, and Rodeo parts of the Fair, and \$10.00 in all other departments. This fee will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protests must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be filed with the Manager within twelve hours AFTER THE CAUSE OF PROTEST. NO COMPLAINT OR APPEAL BASED UPON THE STATEMENT THAT THE JUDGE OR JUDGES ARE INCOMPETENT WILL BE CONSIDERED BY THE BOARD. THE JUDGES' DECISION WILL BE FINAL.

E. RULES GOVERNING LIVESTOCK

1. Rules found in this Section are general, and not intended to be complete, or relieve the responsibility of the rules under individual departments, or alter the fact that rules governing livestock are to be enforced by the chairman of the respective divisions.
2. The N.C.W. District Fair will not be responsible for the death, sickness, or damage of any animal from any cause in route to the fair, during the fair, in route to slaughter, or in route home.

PLEASE SEE: General Rules, Sec. C., Item 4.

3. The Fair Board will have available at the N.C.W. District Fair, an auction whereby suitable market 4-H and FFA livestock can be sold. HOWEVER, the sales are to be made SUBJECT to state and federal inspection at point of slaughter and the owner-operator shall be responsible for care and health of any animal until the animal is loaded at the fair grounds for transportation to point of slaughter. Let it be further understood, that the N.C.W. District Fair will provide a place for exhibit, and arrange for an auction sale, but "The Fair" or its Officers at no time become the owners of the Exhibits. Therefore all costs and care for any Exhibit remain with the OWNER-OPERATOR. The Fair will not be responsible for any sale, collection, or payment not made as part of the regular Auction sale.
4. The Fair Veterinarian will be on the grounds of the Fair on Wednesday 3pm-8pm to visually check all livestock. Livestock may not be brought into the grounds without this examination. The sole responsibility for admittance of an animal is that of the Veterinarian. The Veterinarian will be on the grounds at a specified time each day.
5. Bedding will be furnished for those animals properly entered by an exhibitor. NO HAY OR OTHER FORM OF FEED WILL BE FURNISHED, EXCEPT FOR POULTRY AND RABBITS.
6. All stalls and pens must be cleaned before 8:00 A.M. each day (except horses begin cleaning by 6:00 a.m. to be completed by 7:30 a.m.) and refuse disposed of as directed by the Chairman. A suitable truck will be furnished by the Fair for this purpose, and under no circumstances should the small "Day use" boxes be used for this general cleanup. ANY EXHIBITOR MISSING THIS EARLY CLEANUP WITHOUT PERMISSION OF THE DIVISION CHAIRMAN, WILL BE REFUSED THE RIGHT TO CLEAN LATE, AND WILL BE PENALIZED ALL OR PART OF ANY PREMIUMS TO BE AWARDED.
7. The management reserves the right to cancel any class where there are less than four entries, and combine classes should the best interests of the show require it.

8. It shall be the sole right of the Manager to direct and arrange the Race and Rodeo program. The number of Races and Rodeo events to be during the time scheduled for Grandstand Show, will be determined on a daily basis, to fit the best interests of the show. In case any of the days of the Fair are stormy, and in the judgment of the Board and Manager, and Race & Rodeo Committee the carrying out of the regular program for that day is impractical, such program may be postponed or omitted.
9. No change of ownership or destination of market animal after 6:00 p.m. Saturday.
10. No drug or medications shall be administered on the Fairgrounds unless approved by the fair veterinarian in writing. Anyone caught in this act shall have all exhibits removed from the grounds and forfeiture of all premiums.
11. Any animal carcass that is packer rejected is returned to the exhibitor with forfeiture of all sale monies dealing with that exhibit.
12. A BOY OR GIRL IS ALLOWED TO SELL ONE MARKET ANIMAL THROUGH THE SALES RING (this includes goats) This does not limit the entries, but only this specified number will be sold through the sales ring. If the member is showing more than one animal in the Market division of any class, the member must sell the animal that finished best in the Market Class through the Youth Sale. THE FAIR WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE SALE OF ANY SECOND ANIMALS. The member will take home any second animals or they may be sold private treaty at the fair. For sale signs may be posted no sooner than Sunday morning. THE FAIR BOARD IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY TRANSACTION OUTSIDE THE SALE RING BETWEEN THE BUYER AND EXHIBITOR.
13. Mandatory tagging of all livestock.
14. NO WHITE RIBBON ANIMALS WILL SELL THROUGH THE LIVESTOCK AUCTION.

F. HORSE HANDLING RULES

1. Anyone handling horses must be wearing boots.
2. All exhibitors must be suitably attired. Boots and helmets are required for all classes. Numbers must be clearly visible. Chaps are optional in riding classes.
3. No horses on midway at any time.
4. EXERCISE TIMES-Open; 7 to 8 morning and evening EXCEPT 7 to 7:45 Saturday morning.
4-H: 8 to 9 morning and 6 to 7 evening EXCEPT 7:45 to 8:30 Saturday morning.
5. Horses must be under control at all times. NO LOOSE HORSES ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.
6. All horses must be exercised daily. 4-H and FFA: No longeing.
7. NO RUNNING HORSES. No loping horses outside of arena.
8. No horses allowed outside the designated livestock area. RODEO ARENA IS NOT PART OF THE LIVESTOCK AREA.

G. N.C.W. FAIR 4-H & FFA LIVESTOCK AUCTION SALE

1. It is the responsibility of the livestock buyer to make arrangements for transportation and removal of their animals from the grounds by 6:00 p.m. Sunday. The Fair will have no one on the grounds after 6:00 p.m. for the purpose of watching or feeding the livestock, therefore they must be removed. If you choose to leave custom animals on the fairgrounds after 6:00 p.m., those animals are the complete responsibility of the buyer. Buyers must notify the sales office of transportation arrangements for custom animals before 12 noon, Sunday.
2. Animals sold as custom must be paid for by 12:00 noon on the Sunday of the Fair. If not paid for by 12:00 noon, the animal will be considered a packer animal and be shipped as one. The buyer will be responsible for the support price of the animal.

3. Bids for support price only. The buyer can indicate at the sales office that the bid will go for the support price only. Please keep in mind that market prices bid by commercial packers will be announced for each kind of animal. That portion of the sale price will be paid by the packer and they will receive the animal. The bidder will pay only the portion of the bid above the packer's market price, which will cost approximately:

STEERS: (Avg. wt. 1000 lbs.), each cent bid above commercial bid will cost \$10.00.

HOGS: (Avg. wt. 220 lbs.) each cent bid above commercial bid will cost \$2.00.

If it does not make weight at the weight limit, it does not sell at the Livestock Sale.

SHEEP & GOAT: (Avg. wt. 100 lbs.), each cent bid above commercial bid will cost \$1.00.

4. No White Ribbon Market Animals will sell through the Youth Livestock Sale.

MAKE CHECKS PAYABLE TO: NCW Fair Livestock Sale, Box 460, Waterville, WA 98858. ON SUNDAY animals will not be released unless PAID or arrangements have been made to bill the buyer. Pay Fur and Feather exhibitors directly NOT TO THE LIVESTOCK SALE OFFICE.

H. FUR & FEATHER AUCTION RULES "Cash/Check Sales"

1. The Annual Fur and Feather Auction will be held on Saturday at 9:30 a.m.
2. Only one animal per exhibitor may be sold at auction either in the Livestock or the Fur and Feather Auction.
3. All 4-H and FFA members carrying a rabbit, goat or poultry project may choose to sell one animal that is registered by Thursday at 12:00 noon, in rabbit or poultry barn.
4. Red and blue ribbon animals auctioned only.
5. Buyer has the option of taking animal or turning it back to owner.
6. There will be a minimum base bid of \$10.00 per animal.
7. Exhibitor must have fit and shown animal to be able to auction.
8. Exhibitor will be responsible for animal until purchaser claims after 6:00 p.m. Sunday.
9. Only cash or checks will be accepted by the appropriate department chairperson. No monies to be given to the NCW Livestock Sale.

I. BARN HERDSMANSHIP

All exhibitors including Open Class are expected to care for animal, maintain their pens and equipment properly and to keep stalls and animals clean at all times. The exhibitor will be responsible for feeding and watering of their exhibit. If not done to the satisfaction of the appropriate chairperson, the exhibitor may be asked to remove exhibits from the NCW Fairgrounds and will forfeit any premiums.

J. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS N.C.W. FAIR

1. The N.C.W. Fair will have an official veterinarian in attendance Wednesday and at a specified time each day.
2. All breeding cattle should be blood tested for brucellosis and found negative within 30 days of entry to the fair. Proof of negative blood test or vaccination will be shown to veterinarian. Dairy cattle identified as official calf hood vaccinates under 20 months of age, and beef cattle identified as official calf hood vaccinates under 24 months of age, should not be tested. Steers should be exempt from brucellosis test.
3. Individual health certificates are not required for entry.
4. Fair Veterinarians will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, fur-bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese and turkeys), before they are exhibited, to determine that the livestock and poultry are free from infectious or contagious disease and ectoparasites. All poultry must be U.S.

pullorum-typhoid clean or equivalent or tested negative for pullorum typhoid within ninety days of the exhibit. WAC 16-54-155 Exotic New Castle Disease (END) Emergency Quarantine. This section applies to all avian species and commercial traffic originating from the END quarantine zone in California and to bird exhibits, shows, auctions, public displays and competitions held in Washington State. On entry day, the NCW District Fair will require in writing that each exhibitor attest in writing that they are not in violation of this WAC. This signed document will be forwarded to the State Veterinarian within one week of the conclusion of the event.

5. Fair Veterinarians MUST and WILL REJECT ANY ANIMAL WITH INFECTIOUS OR CONTAGIOUS DISEASE OR ECTOPARASITES. EXHIBITORS should be aware that RINGWORM, WARTS, PINKEYE, STRANGLES, CONTAGIOUS ECTHYMA, SCABIES, LICE, MITES, TICKS, AND FLEAS fall into these categories.
6. No Animal from a quarantined area or premise will be permitted to enter any fair.
7. ALL OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES must comply with the State of Washington import regulations. A health certificate will be issued by an accredited veterinarian from the State of Origin for all out-of-state livestock and poultry entries.
8. No drug or medications shall be administered on the fairgrounds unless approved by the Fair Veterinarian in writing. Anyone caught in this act shall have all exhibits removed from grounds and forfeiture of all premiums.

K. N.C.W. FAIR HORSESHOE TOURNAMENT

There will be four sets of regulation horseshoe pits, allowing us to utilize 8 players at a time, speeding up the tournament.

1. Pre-registration will be from 8:00 to 8:30 a.m. Entry fee is \$8.00 per pitcher per day.
2. All pitchers must come to registration with a ringer percentage. The purpose of the ringer percentage is to group similar abilities together. If you do not have a true ringer percentage, then you MUST pitch 50 shoes with an authorized person and bring the results to registration. This must be completed PRIOR to registration.
3. This year we will be running 2 classes of pitchers for single competition on Saturday speeding up the tournament. It will be called "A" and "B" class. "A" class will consist of the top 50% of the total entries (pitchers) for Saturday's tournament. "B" class will be the remainder pitchers that have signed up for competition.

For example: If there were 20 pitchers signed up for Saturday's tournament, with ringer percentages ranging from a high of 40% to a low of 5%, the dividing point would be at the tenth pitcher (or middle of the group). The top 10 pitchers would be in "A" class and the lower 10 would be in "B" class.

We will pitch both classes together on Saturday. Class "A" will use two pits, class "B" will use the other two pits from the beginning to the end of the tournament.

If a large discrepancy in percentage of ringers is apparent among the pitchers, then the tournament director will make the division where he deems appropriate for fairness in competition.

Doubles tournament on Sunday will be run as we have in the past, awarding 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

4. Tournament starts at 9:00 a.m. SHARP!
5. Singles tournament (Saturday) and Doubles tournament (Sunday) will be 21 points up through quarter finals, then 30 points on semi-final round. No shoe limit.

6. Depending on the number of pitchers for Singles and Doubles, there will be either Round Robin or Double elimination.
7. All participants must sign waiver.
8. All pitchers are responsible for their own horseshoes. No loaners will be available.
- 9 .Players will forfeit their game if they are not available for play

1. Entries will be received from 1:00 p.m. Wednesday until 9 p.m. Wednesday.
2. ALL FLOWERS MUST BE GROWN BY THE EXHIBITOR except for dry arrangements.
3. Cut flowers exhibited will have containers furnished by the NCW Fair. If anyone uses their own containers the Chairpersons and the Fair Association are not responsible. The Chairpersons shall have the right to remove at any time all or part of exhibit which has become unsightly. Flower committee will greatly appreciate it if exhibitors will bring fresh flowers to replace spent blooms.
4. ALL BLOOMS AND FOLIAGE MUST BE GROOMED BEFORE ENTRY, CLEAN AND BUG-FREE. NO WILTED FLOWERS WILL BE ACCEPTED AND IF THEY SHOULD WILT BEFORE JUDGING TIME THEY WILL NOT BE JUDGED.
5. The Danish system of judging will be used and the Judges' decisions will be final.
6. Where a stated number of blooms is listed, be sure you have that number, no more or less.
7. Each exhibitor will be permitted to enter 3 colors in one lot. Any new introduction will be a sub-class automatically.

A Best of Show ribbon + 20 pts will be awarded for Dahlias, Cut Flowers, Decorative Design, Decorative Designs/Wall Design, Potted Plant, Wheat Design', with 3 overall special awards+ 20 pts. for Jr., Adult and Sr. Citizen.

CLASS 1 — CUT FLOWERS

- 1 The flowers listed under Class 1 are the most common in our area. If there is something you have grown but is not listed by name in the premium book, please refer to the last entry number, under miscellaneous. Your entry will be accepted.
- 2 Keep some foliage on the stem of the flower entry (no less than 2 leaves).
- 3 Note in the Premium book whether to bring a spray or spike. Bloom – individual flower, one bloom to a stem, with the stem long enough to be in good proportion to the bloom. Stem – there must be two (2) to five (5) blooms open and/or showing color. Spike – Stem-less flowers on a common stalk - example; gladiolus.
- 4 Exhibits will be taken from 1:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Wednesday.
- 5 Exhibitors are encouraged to replace wilted and faded blooms during the period of the fair. If the Chairpersons replace with fresh flowers, after judging is completed, the color and kind may be altogether different from original entry.
- 6 The North Central Washington District Fair Board rules state that no exhibit may be removed from the buildings before 6:00 p.m. Sunday.
- 7 Anyone having something unusual or different that they do not wish to exhibit, please bring it into the Floriculture building. We would enjoy having it as a special educational display.
- 8 When the premium book says 3 stems try to make sure the blooms are of the same size and the stems are all the same length.
- 9 Disbud your flowers when they are very small. Dahlias will not be judged unless they have been disbudded.
10. Flowers should be cut in early morning or late evening. Place in warm water and keep for several hours or over night in a cool place for best results. Keep in mind how much the bud or blossoms will open before the Thursday AM judging.
11. Identify your entries by species, and common name, if possible as this provides information to the public.

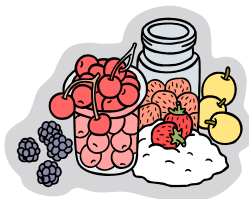

Preparation of Samples:

Go into the field a few days before the grain is ready to cut with the combine, select samples, and with a knife cut them close to the ground, so as to get the full length of the straw. Be careful not to break the straw in handling. Spread samples on a board in the sun to bleach. See that samples do not get wet after being cut. When green color is entirely gone, and straw is dry, bind the bundles, tying with a soft cloth which will not cut straw. Make bundles from three to five inches in diameter just below the head and tie snugly in at least three places, then hang in a dry place with heads down.

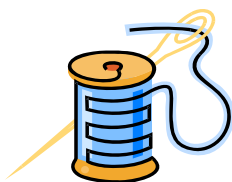

RULES

1. Exhibitor should read rules before filling out entry blank.
2. The Fair will furnish plates where called for.
3. No more than two entries in any one lot may be made by the same exhibitor.
4. All entries in this division must be grown and prepared for exhibit by the exhibitor.
5. Exhibits that have become unsightly because of damage, decay or wilting must be removed from display.
Vegetables or fruits not on premium list will be accepted for display purposes only.

HINTS FOR PREPARING VEGETABLE EXHIBITS

Only vegetables of marketable quality will be considered.

Suggestions for selecting vegetables and fruit for Fair Exhibition:

Select exhibits carefully. Select specimens that are uniform. Avoid those which are bruised or blemished in any way.

ROOTS - Leave tops approximately 1 inch long on crops such as carrots, beets, parsnips, turnip and salsify. Wash carefully.

BEANS - Tender and without strings. Uniformity extreme importance. (No noticeable bulges due to enclosed beans).

CABBAGE - When peeling, leave one set of leaves to be removed in preparing the cabbage for the table.

CARROTS - Avoid injury by severe washing. Smoothness and a genuine carrot color usually accompany good quality carrots.

CORN - Cut straight with tips and butts of full size and filled to end.

CUCUMBERS - Use a knife when picking. Leave ½ inch of stem on.

EGG PLANT - 5" diameter at largest point.

MUSKMELON - Netting deeply ridged uniformly over entire melon. Greenish-yellow ground color.

ONIONS - Should be dry. Remove only as many outer husks as necessary to make onions look clean and attractive. Roots may or may not be removed.

PARSNIP - Avoid breaking tips. 2" - 3" diameter at crown best.

PEPPERS - Uniform size and color.

POTATOES - Good average commercial size. Dig and wash carefully.

PUMPKINS AND SQUASH - Exhibit varieties called for. When ripe, shell is too hard to be pierced with thumbnail. Harvest with knife. Leave 1 or 2 inches of stem.

TOMATOES - Green stems may or may not be removed. Use scissors. Uniform size and color.

TURNIPS - Good average size. Do not remove tails.

A rosette will be awarded to each of the following: the largest cabbage, the largest squash and the largest pumpkin. Shape is unimportant; the award will be decided by weight. Adult (18 & up) - Best Display of Vegetables Junior (under 18) - Best Display of Vegetables Adult (18 & up) - Best Basket of Vegetables Junior (under 18) - Best Basket of Vegetables New varieties of vegetables listed will be placed in a separate lot if judges deem necessary. 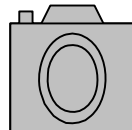

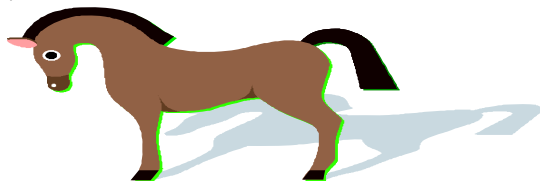

ANIMALS WILL BE PERMITTED TO ENTER FAIRGROUNDS WEDNESDAY, 3 p.m.-8 p.m. NO EXHIBIT CAN BE REMOVED BEFORE 6 p.m. SUNDAY EVENING OF THE FAIR.

Classes shall be as recommended by individual breed regulations. Ribbons and points will be awarded Grand and Reserve Champions.

These descriptions must not exceed 150 words. Description of the garment must be turned in to the barn chairperson or the Fair office no later than Entry Day.

There will be two judges: one to judge the sheep and one to judge the contestant. The contestant receiving the highest point total shall be determined the winner. In case of a tie, bonus points will be awarded for creativeness and originality.

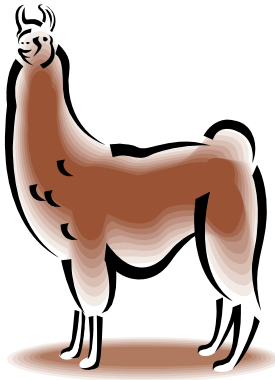

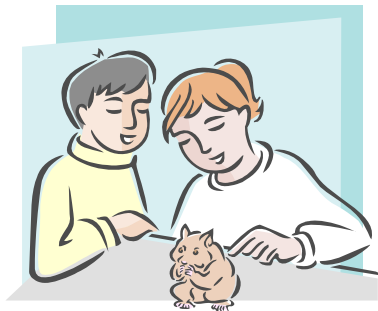

Any coach, or chaperone, failing to help grade cards, or fulfilling his assigned duty of a contest, shall forfeit or be declared as disqualified for his team. Talking or cheating by any team, team member, or coach is an automatic disqualification. These rules will be monitored by the fair board and superintendent.

RULES FOR FFA EXHIBITS

- 1..Read general fair rules for fair board regulations and instructions, also eligible areas from which exhibitors may come: Read all of these rules.
- 2.. Exhibitor tickets must be purchased by July 25 (six (6) dollars). Each instructor will be responsible for the number of tickets they receive. Exhibitor cards with new numbers will be issued and returned to school's instructor. Exhibit Only tickets are no charge but cannot be used for admission to the grounds. Exhibit Only tickets allow the exhibits to be placed for judging and to receive premium points. The Number on the exhibit ticket will be used to enter the exhibits in every department. Each exhibitor will fill out entry tags (top and bottom) completely. Be sure it is legible. One tag for each entry is a must except none are needed for herdsman'ship and decorations. There will not be a separate entry sheet, only names. Use correct numbers on each tag and attach to exhibit, so the judge can fill it out and the clerks can properly identify. Exception is in livestock - bring the bottom of the tag (big portion) with you when each class or lot of your exhibit is called out; the clerk will collect it when judged and mark it accordingly. Failure to follow the above instructions, or if not legible, or wrong numbers will result in "no pay" for the exhibit.
- 3..Each exhibitor shall be enrolled in vocational agriculture in his respective school, (Seniors graduating the spring previous to the fair are eligible to exhibit their supervised farm program and farm shop).
- 4..ALL FAIR PARTICIPANTS MUST CONDUCT THEMSELVES AS RESPONSIBLE CITIZENS.

Any misconduct or unlawful acts on the part of the Exhibitor, patrons or leader will be grounds for suspension of that person from participating in the NCW District Fair. In the event of misconduct on the part of any citizen involved in the NCW District Fair, the Executive Council of the NCW District Fair Board, along with the Department Superintendent and Director in Charge of department involved, will rule on the suspension. Any person or persons suspended from the Fair will forfeit all ribbons and premium monies and will immediately leave the fairgrounds. If that person is an Exhibitor, arrangements for removal of exhibits must be made at once. The NCW Fair Board will set the length of time of suspension period during their next regularly scheduled meeting. Anyone suspended will be notified, in writing, relative to the term of suspension.

- 5..Livestock entries will be accepted 3 p.m-8 p.m. Wednesday after the vet check.
- 6..All horticulture, agronomy and farm shop exhibits must be entered by 8:00 p.m. Wednesday.
- 7..Each instructor shall be responsible for entering and supervision of placement for their chapter's respective exhibits in any part of the FFA Division. (If this is not possible, arrangements must be made with the Superintendent prior to entry time).
- 8..Cash prizes will be paid to Blue, Red and White ribbon winners according to the Danish Point System. Green ribbons will be issued for non-placed exhibits as participation only.
- 9..No exhibitors will be allowed to remove their exhibits before 6:00 p.m. Sunday. Tack can be removed at 5:00 pm, but the animal must remain until 6:00 pm. Fairgoer's may still be in the barns so please make sure to be neat and courteous. Any exhibits removed earlier without special permission will be disqualified, and no payment of premiums will be made.
- 10..Exhibits in horticulture, agronomy, vegetables and canned products must be home grown or from the place where the family income is derived, or a part of the exhibitor's Supervised Program.
- 11..No individual health certificate prior to entry is required but fair veterinary personnel must write a blanket health certificate (see General Rules) certifying that all animals in each class have been examined and found free from symptoms of contagious and infectious diseases. Subject to State Department Regulation Changes.
- 12.All FFA exhibitors should read and adhere to the rules on Barn Herdsmanship.
- 13..Fill out the entry tags using the complete and correct division, class and lot numbers. Each tag must be filled out legibly, with the correct exhibitor number or they will be disqualified.
- 14..All animals exhibited for breeding stock will be shown and judged by breeds. No competition between breeds, nor between sexes. Only breeding stock from Douglas and Chelan County are eligible.
15. All livestock, poultry and rabbits must be owned and cared for by exhibitor at least 30 days prior to fair time. Any given animal or animals may be shown only in one division. Example: a horse in FFA and same horse in open is illegal.

16. All exhibits must have proper quantity to qualify.
17. Each exhibitor may enter only one entry in a lot number, except when lot number is qualified by the statement "any variety" in which case any one exhibitor may enter as many exhibits in that lot as he has varieties, provided that the variety has not been entered under a different lot number, also, except in market livestock he may enter two.
18. An animal may be shown in one lot unless shown as a pen.
19. Each entry must have the correct variety listed on the exhibit tag in order to qualify.
20. All berries to be shown in hillocks and wrapped in cellophane.
21. Class 3, Lot 6 must be approved by the FFA superintendent.
22. ANY QUESTIONS OR PROBLEMS SHOULD BE DIRECTED ONLY TO THE FFA SUPERINTENDENT.
23. All grain and field samples shall be exhibited in one quart clear closed jars.
24. All sheaves shall not be less than 1½ inches and not more than 2½ inches in diameter.
25. All grass and legume seeds shall be exhibited in one pint clear closed jars.
26. All mounts must have been prepared by exhibitor, and must be in book form.
27. Not more than one weed, or one crop of a kind to be shown by any one chapter. This applies only to the plant mounts as singles, not books.
28. All livestock, poultry and rabbits will be fed and cared for by the owner, unless other arrangements are made with the FFA Superintendent. Failure to do this will result in disqualification and removal from the grounds.
29. Weigh animals off the truck, less acceptable shrink of 2%.
30. All beef and dairy cattle scurs not to exceed 2 inches.
31. All beef and dairy cattle shall have a neck rope or safety chain with proper safety snaps. Shall be on the animal at all times when in the barn areas.
32. Definition of ages for beef and dairy:
 - Senior Yearlings - calved between Sept. 1 & Dec. 31.
 - Junior Yearlings - calved between Jan. 1 & Apr. 30.
 - Summer Yearlings - calved between May 1 & Aug. 31.
 - Senior Calves - calved between Sept. 1 & Dec. 31.
 - Junior Calves - calved between Jan. 1 & Apr. 30.
33. Definition of ages for swine.
 - Senior Pig - farrowed between Aug. 1 & Jan. 31.
 - Junior Pig - farrowed between Feb. 1 & July 31.
 - Senior Yearling - farrowed between Aug. 1 & Mar. 15.
 - Junior Yearling - farrowed after Mar. 15 but before May 15.
34. Saleable weights for steers, lamb, hogs and goats shall be as follows:
 - Market Steers 1000 pounds minimum - 1550 maximum.
 - Market Lambs 100 pounds minimum - 150 maximum.
 - Market Hogs 235 pound minimum - 285 pound maximum
 - Market Goats 65 pound minimum-140 pound maximum

35. It is required that all lambs be shorn. Shearing to be done within 30 days prior to the fair.
36. The N.C.W. Fair will not be responsible for restitution of any exhibits lost or animal's death, sic sickness or damage from any cause en route to the fair, during the fair, en route to slaughter or enroute home. The interest of the fair is for the animals sold through the youth livestock sale. The fair is not responsible for sale of any exhibit not a recognized function of the N.C.W. Fair. The N.C.W. Fair will not be responsible for values, or restitution, of condemned carcasses, or parts of a carcass. Condemnation of a carcass will be that from inspectors, veterinarians, or written information from the slaughtering plant. Also read General Rules in the front of this premium book.
37. LIVESTOCK JUDGING SCHEDULE (see schedules on page 9 through page 12).
38. Fitting and Showing is mandatory in at least one class of market livestock in order to receive premiums and to be eligible for the sale.
39. Be sure that exhibitors have Market Health Records and brand slips to turn in at time of arrival and weigh-in. Without those records, the exhibitor will not be able to participate in the livestock sale.
40. Be sure that each exhibitor weighs their animal in beef, sheep and swine market lots and that it is identified as FFA on the weight card. Give chapter name for the address, not the mailing address.
41. Be sure to read the GRADY AUVIL MEMORIAL HORTICULTURE EXHIBIT AWARD in Fruit Exhibits. All entries are subject to approval by the FFA Superintendent before being placed in the exhibit area.
42. No drug or medications shall be administered on the fairgrounds unless approved by the fair veterinarian in writing. Anyone caught in this act shall have all exhibits removed from grounds and forfeiture of all premiums.

43. Any animal carcass that is packer rejected is returned to the exhibitor with forfeiture of all sale monies dealing with that exhibit.

43 .A BOY OR GIRL IS ALLOWED TO SELL ONE MARKET ANIMAL THROUGH THE SALES RING. This does not limit the entries, but only this specified number will be sold through the sales ring. All market animals must sell through the Youth Sale unless a second animal. THE FAIR BOARD IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY TRANSACTION OUTSIDE THE SALE RING BETWEEN THE BUYER AND EXHIBITOR. **NO WHITE RIBBON ANIMALS WILL SELL THROUGH THE LIVESTOCK SALE.**

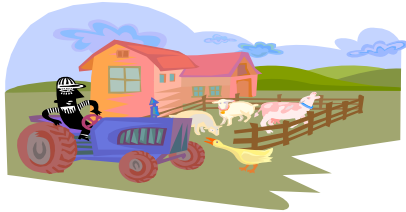

RULES/GUIDELINES for 4-H EXHIBITS



All 4-H exhibits must have been grown or made by the member during the current 4-H year.

1. Read the general fair rules and regulations regarding entry times, judging, payment of premium points and removal of exhibits.
2. Any 4-H member currently enrolled in the 4-H program may exhibit in the N.C.W. Fair. Members can only exhibit in the project areas in which they are enrolled.
3. 4-H age levels (determined by grade level as of Jan. 1 of this year): Primary-grades K, 1 & 2; Junior-grades 3, 4 & 5; Intermediate-grades 6, 7 & 8; Senior-grades 9 through age 19. Primaries will be awarded Participant Ribbons and blue ribbon premium points.
4. Exhibit tags are available at the NCW Fair Office in Waterville and the Chelan-Douglas 4-H Office in Wenatchee.
5. Each exhibitor will fill out exhibit tags (top and bottom) COMPLETELY. One tag per each entry or activity. Use correct number on each tag and attach to exhibit. Failure to follow instructions, wrong number and illegible writing will result in "no pay" for the exhibit.
6. It is the responsibility of each member to check specific requirements under each Class and Lot.
7. No exhibitor shall make more than two entries in any one lot, unless otherwise stated.
8. All exhibits must be in place by 9 00 p.m. Wednesday.
9. "Best of Show" rosettes will be awarded only when there are 5 or more entries in a Class, except where otherwise noted and when judge deems appropriate.
10. All exhibits must remain in place until 6:00 p.m. the last day of the Fair

GENERAL RULES FOR LIVESTOCK

4-H members who are exhibiting Market Animals (beef, sheep, swine & goat) must turn in a Producer Affidavit & Health Record for their animal at weigh-in.

- 1 All entries in registered class must show either certificate of registration in breed association to which it belongs or show satisfactory proof to judge that animal is purebred and application for registration has been made.
- 2 Any 4-H club member regularly enrolled in a livestock project during the current year is eligible.
- 3 Primary 4-H'ers may not be enrolled in nor show dairy goats ,meat goats beef, sheep, or swine projects.
- 3 Animals that are shown in 4-H Club classes cannot be entered in the open classes. (Exception, Lads & Ladies Lead)
- 4 An animal may be shown in only one lot unless shown as a pen.
- 5 Rules for open class livestock apply to 4-H.
- 6 Any animal entered in market-stock classes that have been exhibited at any previous shows must be exhibited by the original owner.
- 7 Grand and Reserve Champion rosettes may be given in all breeds. No champion selected unless judges deem quality fitting.
- 8 LIVESTOCK JUDGING SCHEDULE: ALL LIVESTOCK ARE JUDGED ON THURSDAY. SEE THE 4-H SCHEDULE for starting times.
- 9 Fitting & Showing is mandatory in at least one class of Market Livestock in order to receive premiums and participate in the market sale.
- 10 All fitting and grooming, washing and handling of the animals is to be done by the Exhibitor, except a Junior, who may be assisted by an older 4-H member. All livestock, poultry and rabbits will be fed and cared for by the owner, unless other arrangements are made with the 4-H superintendent. Failure to do this will result in disqualification and removal from the grounds. Leaders or parents may only handle project animals when the safety of the child may be compromised. Out-of-control or unsafe animals should not be exhibited at Fair.
- 11 No drugs or medications shall be administered on the fairgrounds unless approved by the fair veterinarian in writing.
- 12 Any animal carcass that is rejected by the packer will be returned to the exhibitor with forfeiture of sale monies.
- 13 A boy or girl is allowed to sell one market animal through the sales ring. This does not limit the entries, but only this specified number will be sold through the sales ring. All market animals must sell through the Youth Sale unless a second animal. THE FAIR BOARD IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY TRANSACTION OUTSIDE THE SALE RING BETWEEN THE BUYER AND EXHIBITOR. This choice must be made BEFORE time of sale. **NO WHITE RIBBON ANIMAL WILL SELL THROUGH THE LIVESTOCK SALE.**
- 14 All market animals will be weighed off trucks.
- 15 Animal weights: Meat Goats – 65lbs minimum to 140 lbs maximum; Sheep - 100 pounds minimum, 150 pounds maximum; Swine - minimum 235 pounds to maximum 285 pounds; Steers - 1000 pounds minimum to 1550 maximum.
- 16 The Fair Board will have available at the North Central Washington Fair, an auction whereby suitable

market 4-H and FFA livestock can be sold, however, the sales are to be made subject to state and federal inspection at point of slaughter and the owner-operator shall be responsible for any deaths due to any cause whatsoever up to the time the animal is loaded at the fairgrounds for transportation to point of slaughter. Note - The Fair Board recommends that each exhibitor insure his animal(s) so that any loss will be covered.

- 17 No changes of ownership or destination of market animals after 6:00 p.m. on Saturday of the fair.
- 18 It is required that all lambs be shorn within 30 days prior to the Fair.
- 19 All market steers must not have horns; scurs not to exceed 2 inches.
- 20 All beef and dairy cattle shall have extra neck rope or chain with proper safety snaps.
- 21 4-H cattle cannot be shown or sold through the auction unless halter broken and can be handled by exhibitor.
- 22 Goats entered in market and showmanship classes must be polled or dehorned. Horned animals in breeding classes must have horn tips covered as a safety precaution. No horned dairy goats allowed. Possession dates: Feb. 15 on steers; May 15 on all other livestock and horses.



General Rules for Horse Activities

All registration forms need to be filed with the NCW Fair no later than July 24, 2009. Entries for classes can be sent to Shelly Zimmerman, 801 Wheeler Hill Rd., Wenatchee, WA 98801 after you have received your exhibitor number from the NCW Fair.

- 1 All fitting and grooming, washing, saddling and handling of the horse is to be done by the Exhibitor, except a Junior, who may be assisted by an older 4-H member. Leaders or parents may only handle project animals when the safety of the child may be compromised. Out-of-control or unsafe animals should not be exhibited at Fair.
- 2 When entering contests wear clothing appropriate to that contest. Boots are a must. Western cut jeans and long sleeve shirts are required in Western classes. Chaps and spurs are optional. Helmets are required in all classes.
- 3 Equipment to be clean, properly adjusted to both horse and rider and used correctly. Curb chains must be at least 2½ inch wide or larger and lie flat against the jaw of the horse. Tie downs and hackamores are not allowed. Nosebands are not allowed in all western classes. All equipment must conform to the 4-H Horse Contest Guide, PNW 574
- 4 Barn clean-up begins at 6:00 a.m. and must be completed prior to 8:00 a.m. Failure to clean your horse's stall will result in loss of premium points. SEE BARN HERDSMANSHIP.
- 5 Lead chains may be used under the chin if laid flat.
- 6 No chaps in bareback class.
- 7 Exercise time - horses must be saddled and boots and helmets are required.
- 8 No double riding and no switching of horses during exercise time any other time.
- 9 When on barn duty, must wear boots.

HORSE HANDLING RULES

- 1 NO HORSES ON MIDWAY AT ANY TIME.
- 2 OPEN HORSE EXIT: Out North door. 4-H HORSE EXIT: Out East door.
- 3 EXERCISE TIMES - Open: 7:00-8:00 morning and evening EXCEPT to 7:45 Saturday morning. 4-H & FFA: 8:00-9:00 morning and 6:00-7:00 evening EXCEPT 7:45-8:30 on Saturday morning.
- 4 Exhibitor must be riding, longeing or controlled on lead line. NO LOOSE HORSES ALLOWED ON FAIRGROUNDS.
- 5 All horses should be exercised daily.
- 6 NO RUNNING of horses in the arenas.
- 7 No loping of horses allowed outside of arena.
- 8 No horse in 4-H division is allowed in the rodeo arena.

The purpose of Fitting and Showing is to create more interest in, and a better knowledge of fitting, training, handling and showing of the animal. Fitting & Showing is mandatory in at least one class of Market Livestock in order to receive any fair premiums and to be eligible for the sale. Breed type and conformation are not considered. All work in connection with the fitting and showing contest must be done by the contestant. All contestants must fit and show their own animal. Juniors are permitted to have a helper hold the animal while fitting (except for dogs).

Awards are based on: (1) Preparation for showing - 35%; (2) Showing the animal - 55%; (3) Fleshing or condition - 10%.

Rules for 4-H Round Robin – The 4-H Round Robin competition is limited to 4-H intermediates and seniors due to safety issues. The grand and reserve winners in both age groups will advance to the Round Robin with their animals. If a competitor qualifies for Round Robin in both 4-H and FFA, the exhibitor must choose to participate in either 4-H or FFA competition. That exhibitor cannot participate in both. If an exhibitor wins a grand or reserve in more than one species, that exhibitor will decide which species to move forward. The vacancy will be filled with the next blue ribbon until 2 spaces are filled. If there are not 2 eligible winners, an animal will be selected by the judge or superintendent with the owner's permission. This same process will be used if a member declines to participate in the Round Robin. Intermediate and seniors will show at the same time, but only compete in their division, not against each other. Each member will show a beef, sheep, swine, horse and goat. A grand and reserve champion in each division will be selected.

DIVISION 21 — OPEN CLASS CARCASS

Beef Live Judging date — August 23, 2009

Each Class will be pre-registered by mailing in the registration card or phoning the N.C.W. District Fair office at 745-8480 by July 24, 2009. Brand slips, exhibitor tickets, and fees will be collected at the time of entry. Only one entry per class per exhibitor. Beef live judging date – August 23, 2009 entry time - 9 am to noon – judging at 1:00 pm. Sheep and swine entries will be taken on Wednesday, August 26 from 3:00-8:00 pm. Live judging for sheep and swine will be done at 8:00 am on Thursday, August 27, 2009 Carcass class results will be at 12 noon on Saturday, August 29 in the beef barn.*

PURPOSE OF PROGRAM

- 1 To create an awareness of current market demands.
- 2 To provide recognition to exhibitors and breeders for producing high value carcasses.
- 3 To provide information about the carcasses being produced in youth shows.
- 4 To help identify selection, breeding, nutrition and management practices that will result in desirable carcasses.
- 5 To improve the public image of youth & livestock shows.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

The entry fee will be \$60.00 for beef, \$40.00 for swine and \$40.00 for lamb; PLUS an additional fee for a killing charge to be paid to the NCW Fair at the time of entry.

Entries are open to the world, with no designation categories for 4-H, FFA or open competition.

CARCASS CONTEST PROCEDURE

This is a terminal show requiring on hoof evaluation followed by slaughter and carcass evaluation of all entries.

Ribbons will be given for live placings ONLY. Final placing will be determined by:

- a) Live evaluation - 35%
- b) NCW District Fair will take a 25% commission from the total premium pool to offset facilities and operation costs. The remainder of the premium pool will be dispersed in the following manner:

1st place - 50% 2nd place - 30% 3rd place - 20%

If 3 animals do not qualify, premiums will be adjusted proportionately upward.

After carcasses have been evaluated and placed, data will be compiled and displayed with pictures (both live and dead) at 12:00 noon Saturday.

The carcass will be the responsibility of the owner after final display.

Grooming will consist of washing only.

CLASS 1 — BEEF

To qualify for final placing and premiums, the following requirements must be met:

- 1 Hot carcass weight of 600 pounds minimum to 900 pounds maximum.
- 2 Minimum USDA quality grade (Midpoint select)
- 3 Yield grade: 2.9 or less
- 4 Minimum required rib eye will be calculated according to USDA specifications.
- 5 Steers will be shown loose in pen with all beef entries.

CLASS 2 — SWINE

To qualify for final placing and premiums, the following requirements must be met:

- 1 Hot carcass weight: Must weigh at least 150 pounds but not more than 200 pounds.
- 2 Carcass length: A minimum of 30.0 inches, rounded to the nearest tenth of an inch.
- 3 Back fat: .60 inch or less per 100 pounds of hot carcass weight, rounded to the nearest one hundredth (if carcasses are ribbed, carcasses must also have .60 inch or less of 10th rib fat per 100 pounds of hot carcass weight).
- 4 Muscle score: A minimum of intermediate muscle (carcasses must have minimum of 4.5 square inches of loin eye, rounded to the nearest tenth of an inch).
- 5 Carcass Acceptability: Carcasses must have acceptable color and firmness of fat and lean. Carcasses which possess any of the following muscle characteristics of soft and watery, pale color, dark color or a large amount of marbling are considered unacceptable. Carcasses must also be determined acceptable and free of defects which significantly reduce carcass value. For example, carcasses with excessive (greater than 5%) muscle, fat or bone removal due to bruises,

or localized infections will be eliminated.

6 If carcasses are skinned, hot carcass weight will be reduced by the skin weight.

7 Most carcasses will be skinned.

CLASS 3 — SHEEP

To qualify for final placing and premiums, the following requirements must be met:

1 Hot carcass weight: Must weigh at least 50 pounds but not more than 73 pounds.

2 Fat thickness at 12th rib: Must have an adjusted fat thickness of at least .10 inch.

3 Muscling: If ribbing is possible, the minimum rib-eye area requirement is equal to $2.1 + [(Hot\ carcass\ weight - 50) \times .02]$.

4 Quality grade: Low Choice or better.

5 Carcass Acceptability: Carcasses must have acceptable color and firmness of fat and lean and be determined acceptable and free of defects which may significantly reduce carcass value.
